## H1N1 Vaccination Benefits Outweigh Risks according to CDC

“Will the benefits of the 2009 H1N1 influenza vaccine outweigh the risks?” The Centers for Disease Control answers: **YES.**

Currently the 2009 H1N1 influenza virus is causing serious health outcomes for healthy young people from birth through age 24, pregnant women, and adults ages 25-64 who have underlying medical conditions.

Seasonal flu vaccines are highly effective in preventing influenza disease. The expectation is that the vaccine against 2009 H1N1 will work like the seasonal flu vaccines. The CDC and FDA (Food and Drug

Administration) **believe that the benefits of receiving the 2009 H1N1 flu vaccine far outweigh the risks.**

Vaccination is the best way to prevent flu infection and its complications. This is the reason that the CDC, national health organizations, your regional Public Health Network, and healthcare providers intensively promote vaccination for seasonal influenza, and the reason why so much work is being done to have a vaccine available this fall for the 2009 H1N1 influenza virus.

Influenza vaccines do not protect against other viruses that cause

respiratory illnesses. Even after you are vaccinated, it is still important to wash your hands well and often, to cover your cough and sneezes, and to stay home if you are sick (for at least 24 hours after all fever is gone).

The CDC and the FDA encourage you to ask your health care provider any questions you may have. Your health care provider is an excellent source for information on H1N1 and seasonal flu.
